With a new interface designed to be attractive to today's students, *The American Revolution* is the third installment in our digital "micro-archive" program in American history.

**What is it?**

*SUSHO: The American Revolution* is the latest installment in a new Gale series of "micro-archives" devoted to the study of American history through original sources.

Along with *SUSHO: Slavery* and *SUSHO: The Civil War*, it consists of monographs designed for the undergraduate community, along with images and contextualizing essays that offer insight into recent historical interpretation.

Editorial selections and original introductory text is the work of legal scholar Katherine A. Hermés, professor of history at Central Connecticut State University.

**Where did we get the material?**

Gale's in-vault archives, including the Lost Cause Press, ECCO, MoMW, MoML: Legal Treatises, and Sabin. Source libraries include: Bodleian Library; British Library; University of London; Houghton Library, Harvard University; Huntington Library; Oberlin College; University of Virginia; Wisconsin State Historical Society; Yale University; among other institutions.

**Why is the time period or theme it covers significant for our markets?**

The American Revolution is one the cornerstone events in modern history. To serve the needs of students studying this event the archive spans two decades, from the Peace of Paris (1763) to the Peace of Paris (1783), and so it places the Revolution in the global context of British and world history.

Students of military history, political debate, government, society, and culture will find the archive comprehensive. Specific subject categories include: Military Leaders; Land Campaigns and Battles; Naval Campaigns and Battles; Espionage; Taxation; The Right to Rebel; Nation Building; Colonial Policy; The Continental Congress; Religion; Slavery and Race; Indian Relations; and other topics.



**How big is it?**

Nearly 500 titles; or 93,000 pages.

**Why is it unique/competitive advantage?**

The selection of documents makes *SUSHO: The American Revolution* a unique collection, not available through competitors or as Internet freeware. Fully searchable through simple and advanced searches, the database may also be browsed via a topic tree

with accompanying introductory texts and bibliographies -- and so it offers valuable pedagogy for student researchers.

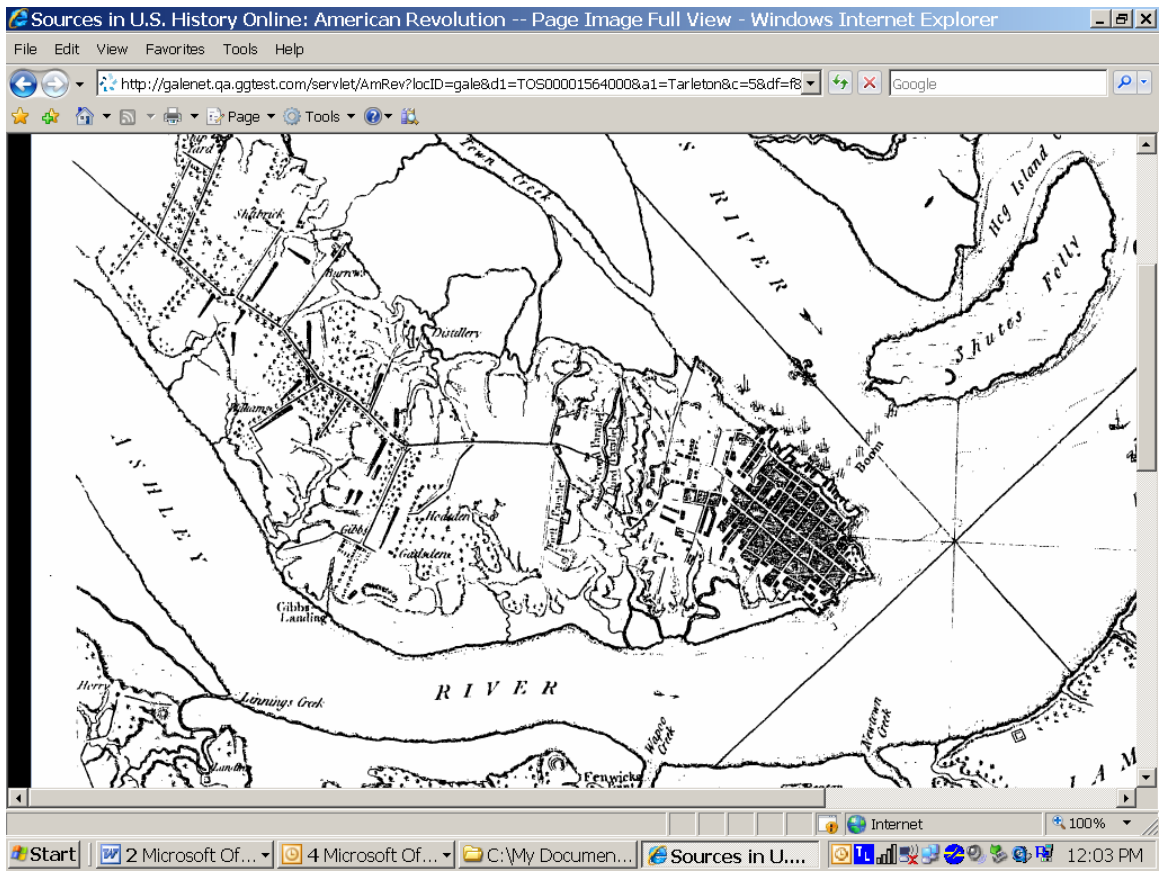

### About *Sources in U.S. History Online*

*Sources in U.S. History Online* is a series of archival digital collections designed for public library patrons and students and faculty in high school, community college, and university. Each archive within the series is dedicated to a major topic in history—slavery; the Civil War; and the American Revolution--and contains about 500 primary sources, comprising a total of 75,000 to 100,000 pages.



The archives are user-friendly and there are several ways to find materials within them. Click on the large illustrations on the opening page to explore documents relevant to significant topics. Or click on the thumbnails at the bottom of the page to access the contents via topics identified by the academic advisors. Here you will find introductory essays providing historical context and educational structure, as well as links to the documents. Alternatively, you may go directly to the key subjects and link to the documents from there.

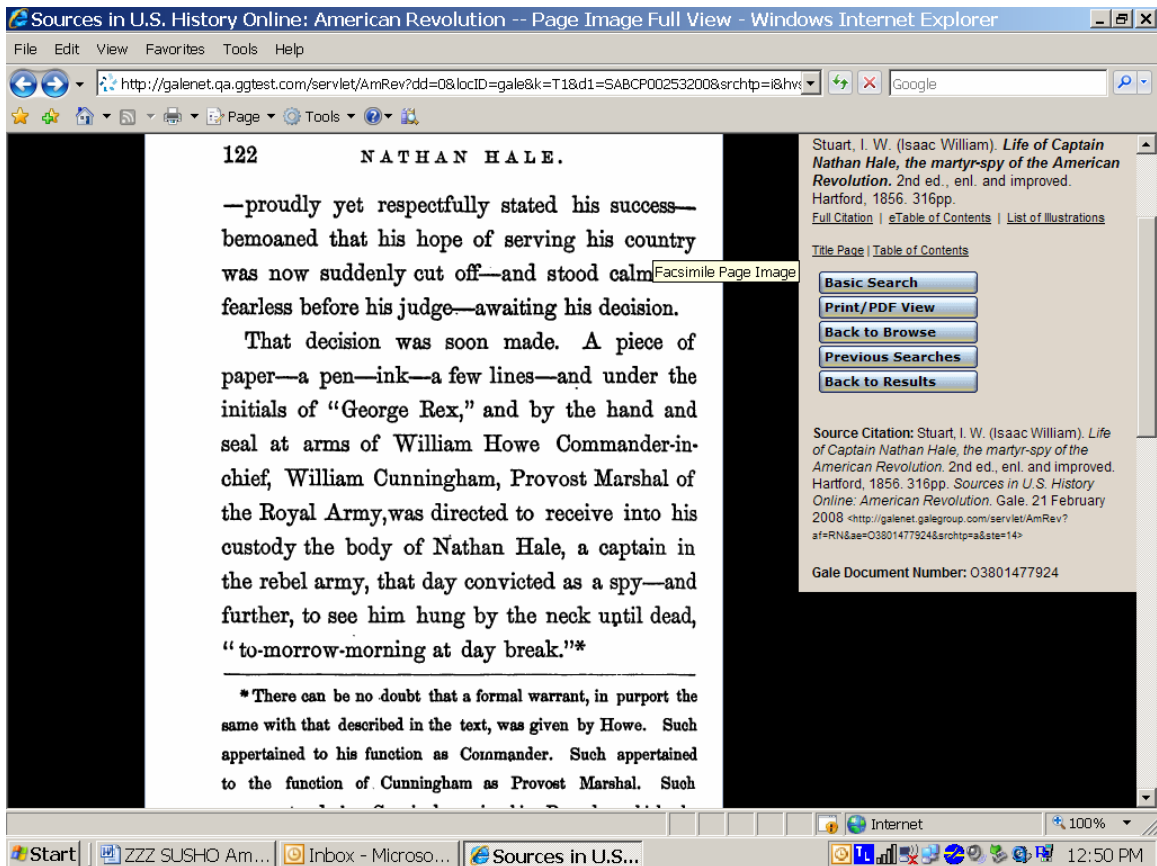
